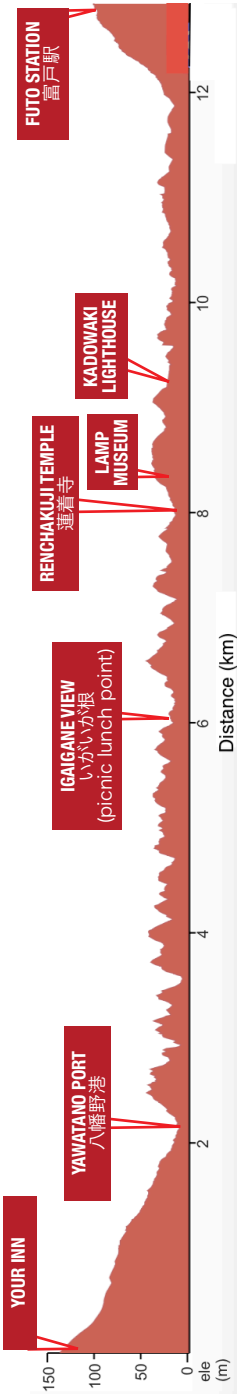
RECOMMENDED WALKING COURSE:

Following breakfast and check out (being sure to return your key, pay for any drinks, and leave luggage at the front desk for courier pickup), depart accommodation by foot. Along the way, buy picnic lunch provisions at a nearby supermarket or convenience store.

Making your way down to a small port, you will soon reach a sign for the trailhead. From here, your route follows along the scenic Jogasaki Coastline, which was formed by the lava flows of Mt Omuro 4000 years ago. The rugged path will take you over tall suspension bridges, towering pine trees, and bring you to your approximate halfway point of Renchakuji, a Buddhist temple of the Nichiren sect.

Departing Renchakuji, you will continue past the New York Lamp Museum and Flower Garden, which is popular amongst Japanese and international tourists. Walking along the forest trail you will arrive at a lighthouse overlooking the second suspension bridge of the day dotted with smiling social media influencers. After making your way through the small crowd around the suspension bridge, you will be on your own again until the sleepy little coastal town of Futo.

Arriving in Futo town, it is a final steeper uphill push to Futo Station (aiming for the 16:01 train or earlier). Reward yourself with a drink from the vending machine and enjoy the air-conditioned carriage of the train on your trip to Kawazu Station. From Kawazu Station it is a short bus ride to your accommodation for the next two nights. Relax in the therapeutic baths before enjoying a well-earned meal of seasonal delights at the inn.



Day 2 Alternative course options

RELAXED COURSE: SHORTEN THE DAY BY ~5KM/3 MILES

To shorten the day, walk the recommended course approximately 8km to finish at the New York Lamp Museum and Flower Garden. Early arrivals may have a chance to visit the museum and garden, then catch a public bus to Izu-Kogen Station. Catch the train from here to Kawazu, followed by another bus to the inn. This course shortens the day by approximately 5km and avoids the final 1km asphalt ascent (+80m elevation gain) to Futo station.

NOT FEELING WELL / SKIPPING THE WALK

If you are not feeling well or need to skip today's walk due to inclement weather, you may take the train from Izu-Kogen Station to Kawazu Station, then make your way directly to the inn by bus. If weather lifts or you have some energy, optional site visits include Mt Omuro or Izu Shaboten Zoo in Izu-Kogen (see previous pages for details) or taking a stroll along the river upon arrival in Kawazu (recommended in late March /early April when the Kawazu-Sakura cherry trees are in blossom). You may have a relaxing lunch in Kawazu then make your way by bus to the inn for a longer bath and a bit more rest/relaxation. Please let our staff know if skipping the walk, so that we may try to negotiate your early arrival at the inn. Please note: As these are smaller, often family-run establishments, depending on staff availability, the accommodation may or may not be able to accept early check-in requests.

● LUNCH/WATER:

For the walk, pick up lunch provisions at the nearby supermarket or convenience store as detailed in notes. There are no other options along the trail.

Though there are vending machines and a cafe/restaurant at the Lamp Museum and Flower Garden (~8km into the walk), it is a popular tourist destination and may have a very long wait time...or limited stock by the time you get there, so please buy a picnic lunch before leaving Izu-Kogen.

Also please make sure you have enough water for the day. It is recommended to take a minimum of 1-1.5 litres of water for a day's walk in warm seasons. Please use this amount as a general guide and adjust accordingly for your own daily water intake. In hotter weather conditions, at least 1.5-2 litres is recommended.

Walk 1.5km down to YAWATANO PORT 八幡野港 and the trailhead start.

10:00 Start your walk along the JOGASAKI COASTLINE 城ヶ崎海岸.

Walk to IGAIGANE いがいが根 for LUNCH (Continue to Renchakuji if early).

13:00 - 13:30 Arrive at RENCHAKUJI TEMPLE 蓮着寺.

Continue walking to the NEW YORK LAMP MUSEUM AND FLOWER GARDEN.

★This point marks approximately 8km into your walk today. If choosing the relaxed course (to cut off the final 5km of the walk) buses depart for Izu-Kogen station from here.

Head down and enjoy the Kadowaki Lighthouse 門脇埼灯台 and Kadowaki Suspension Bridge 門脇つり橋.

Continue your walk to Futo Station 富戸駅.



16:01 TRAIN to KAWAZU STATION 河津駅 (JPY1060, approximately forty minutes. The train is bound for Izu-kyu Shimoda 伊豆急下田 and the stop prior to Kawazu is Imaiama-Kaigan 今井浜海岸)

★This is the latest train you should catch to arrive the inn at a reasonable time for dinner! If fast-paced, there is another train departing Futo at 15:17.

16:41 Arrive at KAWAZU STATION

Check in to nearby accommodation. Consult with staff on check-in regarding dinner time (usually 18:30)

Day 2 Recommended Course Walking Directions: Izu-Kogen → Jogasaki coastline → Futo

After a 7:30 breakfast, be ready to leave the inn by 8:30am.

• Leave the inn and go down the asphalt driveway to the thatched gate exit ahead.

• Follow out left here and continue down the road. Soon reach a smaller lane diverging off the road right.

• Follow right and down this lane, passing a small patch of forest, then lined by homes. At a split ahead, continue with the curve left, then go down right at another split ahead to reach the larger road, Rt. 112.

• Turn left onto the two-lane Rt. 112 and continue down toward the blue road sign. Reach the busier traffic-signalled intersection of the main town road (Rt. 135) and a 7-Eleven convenience store ahead.

★BUY PICNIC LUNCH PROVISIONS:



We suggest visiting the MaxValu supermarket (You may turn left through the parking lot before reaching the main Rt. 135 road), or the 7-Eleven across Rt. 135, to buy a picnic lunch. Prepared bento lunches are usually available at the back right of the supermarket.



• To continue along your route, cross the road at the traffic-signal/zebra crossing to the 7-Eleven, then turn right (or left if exiting 7-Eleven after buying provisions) remain walking the pedestrian way along the main Rt. 135 road.

Pass a drugstore and Daiso 100-yen store. Reach a **traffic-signalized intersection ahead** with sign labeling it **Yawatano 八幡野**.



TAKE CARE ON THIS BUSIER ROAD AS THE PEDESTRIAN WAY BRIEFLY DISAPPEARS AHEAD!



• Turn left at this Yawatano intersection.



You may notice a small blue sign for the historic 下田街道 *Shimoda-Kaido* ("Road to Shimoda") across the street. This route was once a branch of the feudal-era Tokaido Highway, connecting the post towns of Shimoda in the South and Mishima in the North.



Immediately pass a post office (designated by a 〒 symbol. English ATM available here from 9am-5pm if in need of cash), and continue down this road, following the green painted line for pedestrians. Pass underneath the railway bridge ahead.

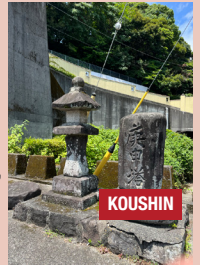
Staying true to this road, continue along until you reach a cross intersection.



★Make a hard left turn here.

KOUSHIN STONE MARKERS/MOUNDS

Heading down the hill some 70m, you may notice the old stone lantern and Koushin 庚申 marker on your right. Though no longer extent, Koushin



was once a very popular folk belief system in Japan from the 9th to 18th Centuries. Derived from Taoism, practitioners would stay up all night (likely singing, dancing, and sake-drinking) every sixty days to prevent demonic entities (or “worms”) from exiting their bodies and confessing their sins to the heavens. Though now mostly considered superstition, some scholars believe that the religion may have been popular with the rural masses because it granted them some political leverage: Koushin acolytes who were not feeling heard by their local magistrates may have been “compelled by the worms” to visit their homes on the 60th day...and show their discontent by having an all-night bender there.

Continue down the hill and on, passing some shops and homes. to reach Yawatano Port in another 200m.

A signboard designates the start of the Jogasaki coastline trail here. Though your path will continue left along the port, there is also a public toilet up the road to the right, if needed (your next toilet option is a slight detour from the Igaigane viewpoint/picnic lunch point





• Follow left at the sign and continue straight between the buildings ahead.



• Continuing straight at a small intersection. The lane narrows and a signpost on the left points to Renchakuji Temple, 5.8km away.

JIZO STATUES/MARKERS

Pass some local Jizo statues next to the signs. The Jizo Boddhistava (equivalent to a Buddhist “saint”) is a protector of weary travellers and lost children. Often depicted wearing a long robe and carrying a staff and jewel, Jizo are usually found at entries and exits to towns/villages, or along more difficult sections of trail that require greater care or attention.



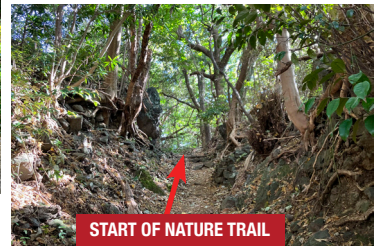
• Reach a slope/stairs going up between the houses ahead.

• Continue left up it and follow a short stretch of concrete to reach the start of the nature trail ahead.

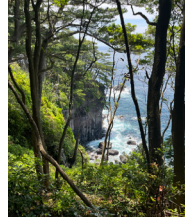
• Pass a family gravesite and more iconic Jizo statues. Reach an intersection with another trail sign (5.6km to Renchakuji Temple).

•Turn right here.

*Take care on rocky undulating trail terrain today (potentially slippery in the wet). A fence lines the way with occasional views along the Jogasaki Coastline.



Descend steeper trail steps ahead (holding the guard rail if slippery), then reach a suspension bridge.

HASHIDATE SUSPENSION BRIDGE

Spanning 60m at a height of 18m, the bridge provides fine view of the volcanic rock formations below. *Please note: the bridge has a twenty-person limit. Take care of children and pets, and do not play on the bridge!

★ If not keen on heights, there is a detour to the left of the bridge. Written in Japanese 迂回路 (*ukairo* "detour") this trail will take you around to the other side of the bridge.

(BRIDGE DETOUR OPTION)



•Cross the bridge and continue along the path to reach another signpost with **Oyodo/Koyodo** written on it.

*Coastal detour option: Detour right (~60m) to head down to the coast and see the columnar joints of the volcanic rock formations up close here.

TAKE CARE ON POTENTIALLY SLIPPERY ROCKY STEPS DOWN. BEST TO AVOID THIS SECTION IN ROUGH WEATHER/SEAS!

OYODO AND KOYODO 大淀小淀

The spectacular rock formations on the coast here are the result of Mt. Omuro's eruption, approximately 4000 years ago. Uniform cooling decreased the volume of lava flows, causing them to crack and create these unique columnar joint patterns.

Oyodo and Koyodo, refer to the “large” and “small” seapools formed here. You may observe sealife in the pools if lucky, and the area is also popular for local fishermen.



• Returning to the trail from the Oyodo/Koyodo detour, follow signs to Renchakuji Temple (5.1km away)

Reach a small concrete bridge ahead.

• Cross over the bridge and head **right**.

Soon reach the fork for **Tajima no taki Waterfall Observation Deck**. Head down to see the waterfall and the beautiful view over the coast.

Tajimi-no-taki waterfall lookout → New York Lamp Museum:
approximately 5km / 3 miles

·After detouring to the waterfall lookout, return to the path. Turn right to follow signs to Renchakuji Temple (4.9km away) and the lamp/flower museum

Pass a signboard for the *isohiyodori* (*Monticola Solitarius*, or “Rock Thrush”) bird. With more beautiful views down below, continue on the (sometimes unkempt, but well-trodden) path to reach another signpost (4.8km) to the temple. You are on track!

TAKE CARE TO REMAIN ON THE MAIN, WIDER PATH AHEAD (FOLLOWING SIGNPOSTS/STAIRS/HANDRAILS).. AVOID STRAYING OFF THE PATH AND INTO THE BUSHES AT ANY FORKS...WITH POTENTIALLY STEEP DROPOFFS!

·Up the steps and passing more pine trees, follow the path down to the **left** of a wooden signpost in Japanese *さいつな* (*Saitsuna*), then left at the small fork ahead (through the tunnel of shrubbery in the overgrown season).



·Continue along the undulating trail to pass a Japanese signpost *おおばい* (*Ooba*), and then down some steeper steps to pass the Japanese signpost *びやくび* (*Byakubi*).



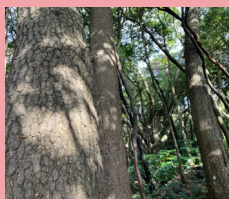

·Follow the winding trail down left, then up again to continue up steeper stone steps. Reach another sign pointing to Renchakuji temple (3.9km away)

JOGASAKI COASTLINE VEGETATION NOTE



Along the Jogasaki Coastline, there are many Japanese *kuro-matsu* (*Pinus thunbergiana*) black pine and *aka-matsu* (*Pinus densiflora*) red pine trees. These are relatively hardy plants that will grow in areas of high salt, and also pollution. However, with the accidental introduction of the pine tree nematode from North America, these species have unfortunately suffered heavy losses throughout Japan in recent years.

As the pines die off, other evergreen trees with much fuller canopies overtake the area, often resulting in a dark undercover. This inhibits other local varieties, such as hydrangeas, from growing to their full potential. That being said, the Jogasaki Coastline is still considered a biodiverse hotspot with many flowering trees, such as wild cherry, magnolia, dogwood, wild peach, and rhododendron/azalea species thriving here. The wax myrtle, or bayberry tree, also grows to very large sizes along the Izu coast.



• Pass a signboard for the *yamamomo* (*Myrica rubra*) wax myrtle/bayberry tree.

Follow the path left at a fence and pass the Japanese signpost **あかね** (*Akane*), followed by more undulating steps and another fence.

Pass the Japanese signpost **ばったり** (*battari*) and soon have a view out to the right on clear day.

Continue with the trail left at the Japanese signpost **てんまじり** (*Tenmajiri*) and reach a larger signboard/fork in the trail.

★ YOU ARE ROUGHLY 5KM INTO THE DAY'S WALK. A FEW METRES AHEAD, A SIGN POINTS 3.1KM TO RENCHAKUJI TEMPLE. FOLLOW RIGHT TO CONTINUE ON COURSE TO THE TEMPLE (LEFT WILL LEAD YOU BACK TO IZU-KOGEN STATION).



• Following right at the fork, pass a Jizo statue, another Japanese signpost **とよ** (*Toyo*), and a sign in English about fish protection. Down some steps ahead, pass another sign to the temple (2.9km away).

·Continue on the trail to reach a sign pointing 2.2km to Renchakuji Temple.

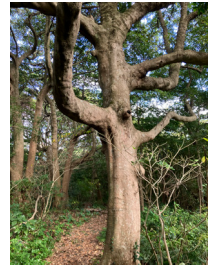
TURN LEFT HERE!



★ DO NOT go right here, and be careful on rockier terrain ahead.



·At the small fork ahead, **stay right** and then continue straight along the path.

Pass Japanese signpost あぶなね (Abunane) and ~100m on, follow left at the Japanese signpost まる根 (Marune) to reach an open area.



The Japanese signpost いがい が根 in the middle of this wider area designates it is **Igaigane**, our **recommended picnic lunch point**. Enjoy the unique rocky terrain and open view of the ocean here!

PICNIC LUNCH OPTION



At Igaigane you may find a spot on the rocks (though be careful of your step), or on a hot day, there is a good position under the trees for some shade. If too early in the day, you may also opt to eat later at Renchakuji temple or the lamp museum area.



SHADED PICNIC SPOT

★A sign here pointing to Igaigane carpark is not your route, but there are public toilets (a 200m detour away) if needed in an emergency..



IGAIGANE AREA

Like the columnar joints you saw earlier today, Igaigane was also formed by the eruption of Mt. Omuro some 4,000 years ago. This open area is a great example of how a large lava flow spreads out and creates a table-shaped landform.

Due to it's flat structure and easy access from the Igaigane carpark, this area is another popular fishing spot for locals..



•From Igaigane, follow the sign pointing to Renchakuji Temple, 1.4km away. ★i.e. **DO NOT** follow the trail to Igaigane Parking lot (unless detouring to toilets and returning).

*Be careful, as there are a number of different little paths from here. Take the path that is closest/parallel to the coast (i.e. passing the picnic shade tree and a larger boulder), and continuing in the direction that you were going before lunch.



Soon reach the Japanese signpost **かんのんの浜 (Kannon-no-hama)**. This area is also locally known as 磯釣りメッカ *iso-tsurimekka*, or "Rock Fishing Mecca".

•Careful on rockier terrain ahead, head up some forty steps and continue on to reach another sign to the temple (1.1km away).

• More steps and undulating trail lead on to reach a sign designating 0.8km to the temple.



300M



• Follow right here and reach the Japanese signpost **にちよう (Nicho)**, as well as an English sign about "Nicho's crack" (another volcanic/geological point of interest).

170M



• Follow the trail left here.

At **だせんば (Dasenba)** signpost ~220m ahead follow the trail left, then stick to the main path on the right to reach **灯明台 (Toumeidai)** signpost some 160m ahead.
***Right here will lead to a fine lookout, or continue left to stay on the path.**

• Continue along the path until you reach a fork.

• Follow the sign for Renchakuji Temple (400m away).
 Go down the slope and reach an open area.

*Though your path with continue up the concrete lane here, you may visit Renchakuji's Okunoin ("back temple hall") to your right.



· Head straight up the concrete path to continue on to Renchakuji's main temple hall.

Pass a viewpoint/sign to 俎岩 *Manaitawa* ("Chopping Board Rock" *See Nichiren story below).

Reach a fork in the path ahead.

· At the fork, right will go to the nearby temple. Left goes to a unique "rock-eating" *mochinoki* (*Ilex integra*, or Bird-lime holly) tree.

Arrive at the carpark of the temple, passing toilets on the left.

The main hall of **Renchakuji Temple** is ahead on the left, up the stairs.

RENCHAKUJI TEMPLE 蓮着寺

It is said that Saint Nichiren, founder of the Nichiren Buddhism sect, was exiled to Ito, just north of Renchakuji Temple in 1261. Brought by boat and left on Manaitaiwa, or "Chopping Board Rock" (named for to its likeness to a flat cutting board), he would have been swallowed by the rising tides had a local fisherman named Yasaburo not saved him. Yasuburo and his wife let Nichiren take refuge in a nearby cave used for storing fishing equipment. Nichiren later came into the acquaintance of a local named Sukemitsu Ito, who was ill and struggling with a high fever. Praying for Sukemitsu, he was instantly healed. Sukemitsu had come upon a small, gold-coloured Buddhist statue while fishing prior, and he gifted this piece to Saint Nichiren in thanks. Nichiren is said to have cherished this statue and travelled with it throughout Japan while spreading his gospel.

•After visiting Renchakuji Temple, head down the driveway in front of the temple. Go left down the stairs and across the open/grassy area, then reach a road.

•Continue up the road. *Take care NOT to enter the property to the right as it is private land (a diving center).



Where the road splits, go right. Then right again at another split in the road ahead. Arrive at the **New York (Tiffany) Lamp Museum & Flower Garden** grounds.

NEW YORK LAMP AND FLOWER MUSEUM



The New York Lamp and Tiffany Lamp Museum exhibits a number of beautiful stained glass pieces of the American art nouveau period. The flower garden has a variety of different plants, but it's main feature is the hydrangeas that typically bloom from late May through June.



There are **toilets** located next to the museum entry/ cafe. There is also a **vending machine** if you are running low on water (drinks change with season and stock is not guaranteed).

TOILETS/VENDING MACHINES



★**RELAXED ITINERARY OPTION** from New York Lamp Museum and Flower Garden:

You have walked roughly 8km/5 miles so far today. From here it is another 5km/3 miles to Futo Station, with the last 1km/0.6 miles being a steep uphill. If energies are waning, you may choose to catch the bus to Izu-Kogen Station from here (followed by a train to Kawazu Station). **Please keep in mind that the last convenient train from Futo Station departs at 16:01** (the same train departs Izu-Kogen at 16:16). Be sure to time your walking pace appropriately.



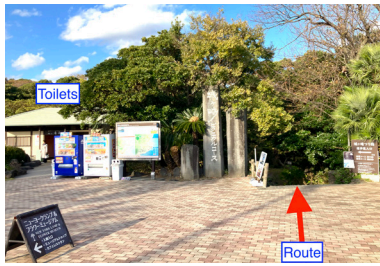

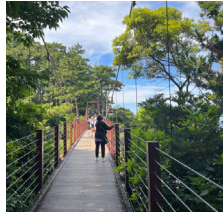


★To continue on your way, the trail entry is just to the right of the toilets/vending machines here. You are now heading to **Kadowaki Suspension Bridge and**

After visiting, follow the trail **behind the shop** next to the lighthouse (i.e. left on approach to the lighthouse) to reach the suspension bridge.

Cross to the other side of the bridge and reach a shelter.

80M



•Go straight past (i.e. to the right of) the shelter, and head down the railed stairs.



You are now heading for **Bora Naya**, a distinctive thatched roof building/restaurant approximately 800m away. **The red paved path will lead you there, but you may also reference details below:**



Pass Japanese signpost *かどかけ* (*kadokake*) followed by *もずがね* (*mozugane*) and continue on the red pavement trail/concrete steps.

Stay right on the red path where there is a fork.

Pass the Japanese signpost *ふたまた* (*futumata*) and a battery ruin dating to the arrival of Commodore Perry's "black ships" in 1854.



800M

Reaching Japanese signpost *こずり* (*kozuri*), again stay right at the fork.



Remain on the red path to reach a set of small stairs, followed by an intersecting road. Cross over and continue straight into the carpark of Bora Naya (*toilets here if needed),

There is a view over to Futo Town, your goal today, here.



BORA NAYA ボラ納屋

The distinct thatched roof structure here, called *Bora Naya* (or "Striped mullet Shack"), was built in 1627 by the Kii family. Once a repair shop for mullet fishermen's boats and equipment, it now serves as a seafood restaurant (intermittently-open).





★The trail continues to to the right of the toilets in the Bora Naya carpark. Now heading for 魚見小屋 Uomi Goya, reach a fork ahead.

*Detour (right here, some 20m) to visit the Uomi Goya fishing hut and shrine if you have time, or continue straight to remain on course.



UOMI GOYA

魚見小屋 Uomi Goya or Fish Watching Huts were used to spot schools of mullet off the coast. They would signal that fish were about and would go out to fish for them. Mullet is no longer fished in these areas.



Reach the end of the trail at the road ahead.

80M

★IT IS ROUGHLY 2.3KM ON ASPHALT FROM HERE TO FUTO STATION (WITH A FINAL +70M ELEVATION CLIMB IN THE LAST 900M).

•Turn right on to the road and continue straight, then follow as it S-bends through the houses. Continue straight/right at a fork and reach a stop signed T-junction ahead.

•Follow right here..

i BE CAREFUL ON THIS BUSIER ROAD, ESPECIALLY AT A NARROWING CORNER AHEAD! WE RECOMMEND FIRST WALKING ON THE LEFT, FACING ONCOMING TRAFFIC, THEN VERY CAREFULLY CROSSING OVER TO THE PEDESTRIAN FOOTPATH. PLEASE AVOID WALKING ON THE ROAD WITH TRAFFIC COMING FROM BEHIND YOU.

Reach a fork in the road ahead.

•Go right here to follow a quieter residential lane. Pass a sign about the stones used to build Edo Castle, and continue on passing homes. The lane climbs to meet the busier road again at an intersection.

• Go straight cross the intersection at the zebra crossing and reach a turn right at the supermarket just ahead.

(*The torii gate of Futo Mishima Shrine is visible ahead. You may visit the shrine if time allows.)



• Turning right, it is a steep uphill from here. Stay left at the fork and reach a Japanese sign pointing to 富戸駅 ("Futo Station").

• Follow right at the sign and soon reach the main road ahead.

60M



Turn left here (i.e. do not continue straight across the intersection), and follow this two-lane road up the remainder of the way to reach **Futo Station 富戸駅** on your right.

*Toilets and vending machine available



At Futo Station 富戸駅

★Be sure to take a boarding ticket from the machine inside the station. (You will need to show this on arrival at Kawazu in order to pay).



Proceed to LINE 1 (trains bound for Izu Kogen 伊豆高原 and Izu Kyu Shimoda 伊豆急下田) to catch the train to **KAWAZU STATION 河津駅**.



Trains depart at: 13:51, 14:31, 15:17, 16:01.

It is approximately forty minutes and JPY1,060 to Kawazu. (*Kawazu is not the final stop, so please be ready to alight on arrival. For reference, the station before Kawazu is Imaihama-Kaigan 今井浜海岸.)
